There are several other issuers reported but not confirmed. These include Augustine and Kyer, Bartell Drug, and the Washington market all of Seattle. Also possible other colors of above issuers. A possible brown Centralia, a white Colfax, and a brown Longview. These las three may however simply be faded other colors.

The following two pieces have no town name on them. They may be for Seattle, or they may be for several locations.

68. Western Thrift Stores white red printing 69. F W Woolworth tan black printing

Tokens have also bee reported from Aberdeen, Hoquiam, Olympia, and Yakima. The issuer's name in Aberdeen a reported Amos and Andy Cafe. There is no confirmation of any of these. It is stated the Hoquiam issue was made of woodpulp. All four were reoprted in 1936.

There are another two pieces that have been seen and recorded, but their location remains unknown. They could be from Aberdeen, Olympia or Yakima as reported above or from some other town.

Information is wanted on the above two items. The denomination of 1/5 cent points towards tax token status for these items.

Cardboard Provisional Tokens of 1941

72. Spokane 1941 date white

Apparently when the State Sales Tax changed from 2% to 3% in 1941, there was a shortage of tokens in Spokane. This is the only provisional issue of 1941 reported. For the State issue Series D see the pattern list we published in the last issue. There is no record or report of any Series D piece ever being in circulation.

There is currently in preparation a new catalog of all State Tax Tokens issued in the United States. I saw a manuscript copy at the 1972 ANA Convention. Hopefully, it will be published later this year. Involved are members of the American Tax Token Society (ATTS). Applications for membership can be obtained from Charles Carter, 721 Glencoe Street, Denver, Colorado 80220. Dues are \$2 per year. They publish a newsletter. Information in this listing came from your Editor and Jerry Schimmel (ATTS President) and Mike Pfefferkorn.

The PNNA is currently working on a slide program which will illustrate the tax tokens of Washington State. When the program is completed, the slides will be made available for loan for club programs in the Northwest.

Next issue, we complete this Tax Token Series with the Tenino Wood.

Editorial Ramblings

This issue we conclude our listing of Sales Tax Tokens of Washington State with the wood issues of Tenino. Members of PNNA with additions or corrections should direct them to our President. Next issue we will begin a listing of Lewis and Clark Exposition pieces produced for the 1904-05 Fair in Portland, Oregon. Terry Trantow is the author. I hope PNNA members are aware of the U.S. Food Stamp Program -- not as recipients, but as interested parties to a numismatic item. Grocery stores are not allowed to give change for food stamps in cash. They have to use credit slips of some sort. Many of these resemble paper money and are collectible. Ask your grocer what he uses to make change for food stamps. You may start a new inexpensive collection. Two new catalogs just out list numismatic items of the Northwest. A catalog entitled Real Estate Tokens by John Coffee lists some pieces of Washiggton State, and the second work, Parking Tokens of the World, by Duane Feisel, lists parking tokens from Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. Quarterman Publishing in Boston has reprinted the King book on Masonic Chapter pennies. Many pieces of the Northwest are listed. Over 60 from Idaho, over 100 from Oregon, over 90 from Washington and over 50 from British Columbia. If the recent surge in coin prices has slowed your collecting down, perhaps you might be interested in one of these different fields. Give it a try.

Wood Provisional Tokens of 1935

Tenino is the home of wooden money in the United States. The emergency wooden strip of December 1931 started the large scale issue of wooden money across the country. When the 1935 tax law went into effect on May 1, 1935, Tenino again resorted to wood for emergency issues. Altogether, the total mintage of wood tax tokens for Tenino amounted to 20,000 pieces. There were twelve different issuing business firms. Some of these business establishments used more than one variety.

Our list will list varieties by color and by large and small case letters. Minor differences caused by spacing of letters will not be listed, mainly because there is no end of them. On these minor differences, the letters and lines vary in size and length. The colors vary from light to dark. This color variation may result from something in the wood re-acting with the ink. Or maybe because they were not too careful in mixing inks. There are blue and green pieces. The blue-green pieces though may just be careless inking of the printing plates. There is much confusion over some of these color variations. What one will call blue, another will call green. Most all these conflicts are the blue-green peices mentioned above.

The above reverses with the donkey and in some cases the words "Is his face red" is a political comment with several meanings as follows. There were charges of socialism and communism over the tax laws. There was comment on the fact the regular issue aluminum tokens were not available for circulation on time and emergency means had to be taken. There were charges and a court test claiming the tax law and token issue was unconstitutional. You can use your own interpretation of the meaning meant by the issuer.

Concerning rarity - the Thurston County Independent is the most common issue. There is only one or two specimens known of the Empire Inn. The green Jack Horner and red White Front Garage are rare. Most of the other issuers tokens are available occasionally, but some color varieties are rare. Collectors would be advised to just attempt a set of different issuers since it would be nigh impossible to complete a set of all color varieties.

Your Editor knows of one collection containing ll of the twelve issuers and another with nine out of twelve. No complete issuers sets are known.

Members who can report color varieties and any other issuers are asked to report same to the PNNA President.

Tenino comes both ways - TENINO and Tenino. And in Thurston County Independent issues - some come with County abbreviated Co., some have REDEEMABLE and some Redeemable, and some come with and without town name.

The PNNA Slide series on Washington State Depression scrip will have a showing Oct. 20th at the Aberdeen Coin Club meeting, it has also been requested by the Coquille Valley Numismatists. Collectors in the area are invited to attend the meeting of the Grays Harbor Numismatic Society to see this program. The meeting site is the Aberdeen Federal Savings and Loan at 7:30 PM. I should mention that another slide series is under production on the tax takens of Washington State with emphasis on the private issue cardboard and wood specimens as well as several pattern issues. Also in the sale was one of the four known Washington Territory NB notes. It brought \$3600. It isn't just Lincoln cents that are valuable. Maybe you should invest in a few good numismatic books and learn what is rare and desirable.

The Seattle Convention Bureau has asked about bidding for the 1978 or '79 ANA Convention to be held maybe at the Seattle Center. Some of the area clubs are voting now whether to sponsor this bid. Let the PNNA President know your thoughts regarding this possible bid at her address above.

The next issue of the PNNA News due in a couple weeks will have the start of a catalog on Lewis and Clark Exposition medals of 1904-05. Anyone who wishes to join the PNNA and receive the News can send \$2 to the President.

This is the official State medal for the Bicentennial. Sculpter was James Wehn of Seattle. Mr Wehn also was the sculptor for the 1953 Wash. Territorial Centennial medal and the statue of Chief Seattle on Denny Way in Seattle is his work.
