It is time for March Madness ... not only for college basketball, but also time for the spring coin shows and the upcoming PNNA convention ... Here are a few updates on upcoming PNNA projects.

PNNA Convention — It is time for the convention!!! Come one, come all!!! The bourse is completely sold out - with dealers coming in from all over the Northwest as well as from around the country. We actually sold about 10 more tables than last year - the place is going to be packed with just about every form of numismatic item imaginable. Our headline speaker this year will be Chris Connell from the ANA - he will provide two talks - one on Beginning Numismatics and another on Byzantine Coinage (for additional speakers and times - please check the numismatic theater schedule on the PNNA website at www.pnna.org). Chris will also be one of the instructors at the upcoming PNNA/ANA seminar (see below). The show will also feature competitive numismatic exhibits and a medieval coinage demonstration that will offer coins specially designed for this year's convention. Last year we almost doubled attendance - help us do the same this year!!!

PNNA Scholarship Program - As I write this, the deadline for applications has passed for consideration of this year's scholarship to the ANA Summer Seminar. Several applications were received and the winner will be announced in the next issue of *The Nor'wester*.

YN "Design a Quarter" Contest - Now is the time to get those schools involved in the "Design a Quarter" contest. Please contact me immediately if you are planning on participating in this project. Aimed at the 5th and 6th grade levels, the "Design a Quarter" contest reached 21 classrooms last year. The program, in participation with local coin clubs and collectors, will promote awareness of the 50 States Quarter Program and give the kids an opportunity to submit their designs of what they think should be on our statehood quarters. Clubs will locate teachers/schools/classrooms willing to participate in the program, coordinate the delivery and pickup of quarter design sheets, provide a current statehood quarter for

each participating student (additional prizes/materials can be distributed at club's discretion), judge each classroom's submissions to select a classroom winner, and finally submit the winning classroom designs to the PNNA for display and final judging at the PNNA convention in April. The PNNA will provide design sheets/design criteria, provide one silver eagle for the winning design from each participation classroom (limit of two classrooms per club - additional classrooms can be funded at the club's expense), provide exhibit space for the winning designs at the PNNA convention, and provide the grand prize of a 1/4 ounce gold eagle. Final designs must be submitted to the PNNA no later than April 15, 2003.

YN Treasure Trivia Program - The YN program at this year's convention will feature a Treasure Trivia game. YNs will search the room for signs at participating dealer's tables and be required to answer a numismatic trivia question at each table (with the dealer's help of course). Upon achieving the correct answer, the YN will receive a free numismatic item and continue on with the hunt. Those that complete the hunt will be entered into a drawing with additional prizes as well as a 1/10th ounce gold eagle. Let those YNs out there know about the program and bring them to the show!!!

PNNA Seminar Series - The PNNA and ANA are co-sponsoring two separate seminars the weekend of October 24-26, 2003 to be held at the Tukwila/SeaTac area Courtyard Marriott hotel. Attendees will have their choice of either Grading U.S. Coins or Ancient Roman and Byzantine Coinage. Seminar tuition is expected to be \$350 for the Grading U.S. Coins class and \$325 for the Roman and Byzantine class. A \$25 discount will be offered to PNNA members and an additional \$25 discount will be offered to ANA members. Both seminars include lunches and beverages for all three days. Seminar students will receive ANA certificates of completion for each class — furthermore, the Grading U.S. Coins class will fulfill the ANA Numismatic Diploma grading requirement. NCW Program Continued

The PNNA board has made the annual National Coin Week contest among member clubs a permanent program. The NCW theme for 2003 is *The Tale of the Coin*.

The awards are \$100-\$75-\$50 for the top three club efforts (the Olympia Coin Club won in 2002). The annual theme does not have to be part of your effort; if you have an already-established program for promoting coin collecting in your community that does not refer directly to the annual NCW theme, it is still acceptable for consideration. Send a report of your club's efforts to Larry Rowe at PO Box 61621, Vancouver, WA 98666 not later than 31 May.

Remember that the ANA also gives awards for NCW promotion excellence. If your club belongs to the ANA, submit a report to the Education Department to be considered for this award.

Exhibits at the 2003 PNNA Convention

Exhibits must be in place by noon on Saturday 26 April to be eligible for awards, which will be announced later that day (or evening, if there is a banquet). We would prefer to have your exhibits in place on Friday, so that visitors to the convention can view and learn from them. If you want to use PNNA cases, you must send an application to Larry Rowe by 18 April so that those cases can be available. Use the form enclosed to apply for exhibit space and exhibit cases (send to Larry Rowe, PO Box 61621, Vancouver, WA 98666; phone 360-573-9827; e-mail medalman@paclink.com). Remember that the PNNA best of show winner receives \$200 in assistance to take the winning exhibit to the ANA anniversary convention in the same year.

The complete exhibit application is four pages long, just like ANA's. Pages 2-4 are only needed if you intend to have someone else place or remove your exhibit or if you are a multiple winner of first place

awards at previous PNNA conventions. If you think you need the last three pages (not included here to save postage), ask for a complete copy of the rules from the secretary at the address in the letterhead. There are several references to specific parts of the rules in the application; if you have a copy of the ANA rules, you can determine what those references are without having the PNNA rules in hand.

Exhibits at the ANA 2003 Anniversary Convention

If you want to exhibit at the ANA anniversary convention in Baltimore in July-August, ask ANA for an exhibit application now (contact PNNA secretary Joe Boling if you require assistance). *The application deadline is 2 June 2003.*

Bob Everett Memorial Award

The committee for this award needs nominations immediately. Nominees need not be members of local or other clubs, but must have demonstrated a commitment to numismatics in the Pacific NW. Send nominations to Joe Boling, Larry Rowe, Jim Paine, Eric Holcomb, or Del Cushing.

Wood Exhibit Cases Available

As the PNNA continues to convert to aluminum exhibit cases for exhibitors and dealers, the wood cases that we have used for decades are available to interested buyers. The first cases to be sold will be the older less-well-finished cases, for \$10 each. When the better-finished cases are sold, they will go for \$15 each. These cases can be used for club exhibits, or for personal exhibits at PNNA conventions and elsewhere. They measure 19x31 inches outside, 17.5 x 29.5 inches inside. In Memory of Freda Peterson

Hadrian by Joseph Kleinman

When we consider the careers of the Roman Emperors, most of us might conger up in our imagination

images of people who we would rather not associate with. Emperors such as Caligula, Nero and Commodus to name just a few. However, there were quite a number of good emperors, gifted men such as Vespasian, Titus and Nerva and his successor Trajan. It was Trajan who brought the empire to its greatest size in terms of territory or lands conquered.

Hadrian, the subject of this article, was in my opinion the greatest of all emperors. Why you might ask would I subscribe to that opinion. Because it was Hadrian who transformed the empire from a society of rank and privilege as far as the provinces were concerned into a commonwealth of equal districts. Upon becoming emperor as a consequence of Trajan's death in AD 117, he began a program of reforms which touch our lives even to this day. He was the first emperor to codify Roman law and eliminated some of the abuses of the slave system. For example, a slave owner could no longer sell a slave to a gladiatorial school. However, some of his reforms were not popular with the Senate as they felt that their privileges were undermined. It is important to remember that Hadrian like his uncle Trajan before him was a Spaniard. This would explain his more favorable treatment toward his non-Italian subjects.

Hadrian considered himself another Augustus in that he created a new world order. He was a tireless worker on behalf of the welfare of the empire and made two separate tours of the provinces to see that his reforms were carried out. One of those reforms was in the realm of military policy. For centuries Rome had been an aggressive conquering state. It was Hadrian who made the decision to consolidate rather than to expand the frontiers of empire. When I visited England a number of years ago, I had the privilege of walking on part of the wall he ordered built across that island. This new policy led to an era of piece and prosperity the world had never known.

Hadrian was a man of many talents, Statesman, Philosopher, Architect, Soldier and even Poet. Had I been in Rome on the occasion of one of his returns to that city, I would have greeted him together with the rest of the populace in the salute, hale Caesar, hale Hadrian.

The coin available for viewing on the following web site is a Silver Denarius showing the bust of the emperor and the personification Fortuna on the reverse holding a rudder and cornucopia. This to celebrate the fortunate return of the emperor to Rome. The coinage of Hadrian is quite reasonable in cost and makes an excellent theme for a collection.

Greg Franck-Weiby (moneyer) is making a special coin for the Portland ANA 2004 convention. Dies would be \$100 each plus the costs of planchets. We could have souvenirs for registration (pewter) and silver pieces for sale at the show. The show committee will proceed to explore this opportunity.

Web site report. The web site is still getting over 100 page-views per day. ANA is hosting it now, so we are no longer paying hosting fees. The webmaster (Eric Holcomb) is looking for articles, current information on shows, and other content to place on our site.

- The PNNA is again running the “design a quarter” program for 5th and 6th grade students. The Seattle Numismatic Society is going to operate the program in up to 25 classrooms; other clubs are also involved. PNNA funds awards for up to two classrooms per school; participating clubs provide the balance of awards. The designs of individual classroom winners will go to the PNNA convention for final judging.
- PNNA educational seminar — the committee is working on fall 2003. The Courtyard Marriott (the convention HQ hotel) is not expensive if we use the hotel’s food service. We can also get the ANA involved, making it an official ANA educational forum, but also splitting any profit that is made. We could still pick the topics, and the ANA would assist in recruiting speakers (and ANA would cover some of the logistics, such as processing registration and issuing completion certificates). The committee is looking for the board’s preference for direction. Moved and seconded (Gaye/Rowe) to do a joint project with the ANA. Question from Holcomb — would our committee still be responsible for picking the topic? Yes. We are looking at doing parallel topics, two at the same event. Passed.
- Cushing — the casino chip collectors want to use a room in the Tukwila Community Center for a low-level bourse on Sunday of the convention. Billings — it’s probably OK, but we need to coordinate with the community center and look at how admission fees would be handled. Some reservations were expressed by members present. Holcomb — the show committee should have discretion to rent it out if appropriate. No motion was presented.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:00 PM.

DON BAILEY NAMED ANA COORDINATOR FOR NEW REGION

— Don Bailey, an expert Mexican numismatist, has been named to represent the ANA clubs and members in Mexico, Central and South America. "In recent years, there has been an increase in activity among the ANA, and the clubs and collectors of Latin America," says Association President John Wilson. "Don Bailey is the perfect choice to help that relationship grow."

Scott Loos, who, along with his wife, Lisa, coordinates the Association's Representative Program, says, "Don is well recognized for his expertise and experience with Mexican and other Latin American numismatics, and will do a great job as coordinator for the newly created Region 30." Regional, district and local volunteers in the ANA Representative Program work directly with collectors and clubs to promote and expand the numismatic hobby through services and programs offered by the Association.

A life member of the ANA, Bailey has been a member of the Sociedad Numismatica de Mexico (Numismatic Society of Mexico) for more than three decades and served as that organization's United States representative for a number of years.

National Coordinators Scott and Lisa Loos also announced other changes in the ANA's Representative program. Region 24 Coordinator William F. "Bill" Arnold of Cheyenne, Wyoming, will now represent Colorado and Wyoming. Region 25 Coordinator Jeff Arbogast of Sandy, Utah, will now represent Idaho, Montana and Utah.

COLONIAL WILLIAMSBURG'S NUMISMATIC HISTORY COMES TO LIFE IN SPECIAL SEMINAR

— The ANA is offering a special seminar on 18th-century numismatics at Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, immediately following the ANA World's Fair of Money in Baltimore this summer.

"We are looking forward to a wonderful exploration of colonial America numismatics in a place resonating with the history of those early days of America," says Gail Baker, ANA director of education. "We have offered classes on this topic by some of the finest colonial specialists, but never have we had the opportunity to do so with leading experts in such an ideal historic setting."

Williamsburg served as the capital of England's Virginia Colony from 1699 to 1780. A year later, the local government moved to Richmond and the colonial village, where the fiery seeds of liberty were sown, quietly receded into the background. In 1926, at the

urging of the Rev. Dr. W.A.R. Goodwin, John D. Rockefeller Jr. began buying up the houses, shops and other buildings, most on their original foundations, to restore the community to a living history center. Today, the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, a private, nonprofit educational institution, preserves and interprets the historic area.

Limited to 20 participants, the ANA seminar will be led by Erik Goldstein and Richard Doty, numismatic curators at Colonial Williamsburg and the Smithsonian Institution, respectively, and colonial numismatic specialist John Kraljevich of Bowers and Merena Galleries. They will provide a view of the historic community's famous collection of Colonial and Continental paper money, as well as other money from the era, including French, Dutch and Spanish pieces; Massachusetts and New England silver; Colonial copper coins; and much, much more. Students in the seminar also will go behind the scenes at the DeWitt Wallace Museum's Collections and Conservation Building for demonstrations in the state-of-the-art conservation areas, photography studios and archives.

The ANA seminar is scheduled for August 3-6. Tuition includes admittance to all general sessions, a welcome reception and graduation banquet, a "Freedom Pass" for Colonial Williamsburg's historic buildings and activities, dinner at one of the famous taverns on Duke of Gloucester Street and three nights' lodging at either the Williamsburg Lodge (inside the historic district) or nearby Woodlands Hotel.
