Call for Puyallup Fair Volunteers

It’s Fair Season once again! I’m sure most of you know that the PNNA sponsors a display at the Hobby Hall of the Puyallup Fair every year and 2011 is no exception. This year’s coordinator for the Hobby Hall display is Rick Schulz. Rick is tasked with developing and setting up the display and rounding up volunteers to staff the display during the run of the Fair.

Many PNNA members look forward to working the Fair each year and the signup sheet is filling up as Rick circulates it at local club meetings. This year we’d like to expand the opportunity to volunteer to members outside the Seattle to Olympia area. Scheduling conflicts and travel distances make it hard for Rick to visit every PNNA member club and that is where you come in. If you are reading this you are most likely a PNNA member and a member of a local club. We’d ask you to take this offer to your next club meeting and share it with your fellow members.

The Puyallup Fair runs from Friday, September 9 through Sunday, September 25. Volunteers are asked to staff the display for a four-hour shift to answer questions posed by Fair visitors. Often heard questions include, “My husband recently died and I’m left with his collection. What do I do with it?” Or, “I’ve had this old silver dollar for years, what’s it worth?” Questions can be on any aspect of numismatics and it is understandable that we’re all not experts on every aspect of our hobby. If you can’t answer a question you probably know someone who can or you can suggest books to read or even suggest a local coin club or show for an answer. There will be flyers listing local clubs and show dates available. [Editor’s note: It’s also recommended that unanswered questions be sent to info@pnna.org, so they can be directed to an appropriate PNNA member or outside expert for a response.]

Another job for volunteers is to run the penny-birth date game for the kids. There are a lot of variations to this game but basically a child will search a tray of pennies for one from their birth year. The volunteer will 2x2 it up for the child to take home a souvenir. There will also be a tray of foreign coins to be 2x2ed and given as prizes. This is a lot of fun and the kids (of all ages) are great.

Shifts run from 10 AM-2 PM, 2 PM-6 PM and 6 PM-10 PM each day of the Fair. There is room behind the desk for two volunteers to sit comfortably. Any more chairs gets a little tight. If two couples want to share a shift they could split it up between them.

Each volunteer will receive a day pass to the Fair so that when they are not staffing the display they can enjoy the Puyallup Fair, one of the biggest fairs in the country. Free employee parking is available but it is a

bit far from the fairgrounds. A few parking passes are available. Arrangements can be made for those with problems walking distances.

The Puyallup Fair (officially known as the Western Washington Fair) is the largest single attraction held annually in the state of Washington. The Fair continually ranks in the top ten largest fairs in the world. For more information on what to see and do at the Puyallup Fair check out their web site, www.thefair.com.

PNNA Club Rep Program

Last Fall the PNNA Board of Directors approved a plan to develop a PNNA Club Representative Program to better connect local clubs to the benefits of their PNNA membership. Modeled on the American Numismatic Association's Club Rep program, the PNNA Club Rep would act as a liaison between the local clubs and the PNNA. Local clubs benefit by having a direct connection to the PNNA Board of Directors. Club Reps can report all that is new within the PNNA that is a benefit to the local clubs and their members, such as training seminars, program resources, show resources, etc. Club Reps can pass along questions and suggestions and complaints to the Club Rep Coordinator and thus, to the PNNA Board. The benefit to the PNNA is that the Club Rep can keep contact information and the names of current officers current in the PNNA records. This is important because one of the best ways for people to find out about your club is through the PNNA. The PNNA keeps local club meeting and contact information on their web site www.pnna.org and printed up on flyers that are available at local shows. How many prospective members has your club lost because of outdated information on the PNNA web site?

Last winter Rick Schulz, the PNNA Club Rep Program Coordinator, sent out letters asking local clubs to get on board by selecting a club rep from their membership. Several clubs have responded but so far progress has been slow. If you have a Club Rep Rick would like their name and email address so that we can start a dialog. We feel that there is a potential here for something great for local collectors and their clubs. Local clubs pay annual dues to the PNNA. They should get something for their membership. The PNNA Club Rep Program is a way to do this.

PNNA 62nd Annual Convention, April 8-10, 2011 in Tukwila

The biggest annual coin show in the Pacific Northwest, sponsored by the Pacific Northwest Numismatic Association (PNNA) and now in its 11th year in Tukwila, was once again a big success, with strong attendance especially on Friday and Saturday. Total three-day attendance was estimated at well over 1,000. Activity was strong, and not just due to high bullion prices; collector coins, tokens and medals also did well.

In addition to bourse activity, there were exhibits, awards, numismatic theater and club meetings on Saturday, and a popular Young Numismatists (YN) program.

Juniors on the bourse floor were excited to have the opportunity to complete a set of numismatic items as part of the Young Numismatist (YN) "Treasure Hunt" game. Participation was excellent as always! (Walt Ostromecki reported that over 70 kids completed the program on Saturday.)

Boy and Girl Scout workshops were conducted on Saturday by James Reinders. Although attendance was low (in part due to spring break), those who did attend reported a successful program.

There were several collector exhibits this year, all of which were quite interesting!

Attendees once again received custom designed and struck pewter "tokens" while supplies lasted!

Special thanks to Mike Labosier for serving as general chairman for the 2011 convention.

The PNNA is pleased to announce that the association's annual convention will again be held at the Tukwila Community Center in 2011. The exact dates will be announced shortly, pending resolution of a possible conflict with the Santa Clara, CA coin show.

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PNNA Board Meeting Minutes

9 April 2010, Tukwila, Washington

PNNA Membership Meeting Minutes

9 April 2010, Tukwila, Washington

President Lisa Loos called the meeting to order at approximately 6:15 p.m. Lisa introduced herself, welcomed the attendees and explained the meeting format. The PNNA officers and board members then introduced themselves.

Update of Activities

Lisa led a review of recent work underway by the board:

Dennis Stevens provided new sidewalk sign boards to direct the public to coin shows. These were first used at this year's Spring Convention and are available to member clubs for shows they sponsor.

A new Club Literary Award has been established to promote excellence in member club newsletters.

Rick Schulz has spearheaded a new PNNA Club Representative program.

The PNNA is considering a re-designed club logo. There may be a contest to encourage creative new ideas.

Eric Holcomb is working on a re-design of the PNNA website and is continually seeking and proposing new ideas for improvements and new content.

A committee of the board is reviewing the PNNA By-Laws to consider if updates or other revisions are needed.

Committee Updates:

Convention – Mike Labosier gave a brief update on the Spring Convention that was underway. Attendance through day two was just slightly under last year's level at about 920 paid admissions. He also noted that the PNNA tried radio and internet advertising for the first time this year, in place of the newspaper display ads that have traditionally been used. Other new features this year include an ATM available at the Convention and the resumption of Numismatic Theater presentations. Scott gave a brief report on bourse activity and noted that the bourse was sold out, as usual. Walt Ostromecki commented that 71 kids had participated in the YN Treasure Hunt so far.

Exhibits – Dan Vornbrock noted that there were seven exhibits at this year's Spring Convention, the same number as last year. He suggested that the People's Choice award be resumed to help promote interest among exhibitors and the visiting public. Eric announced the Convention's exhibit award winners: (See page 3.)

There were three noncompetitive exhibits this year. It was suggested that the location of the exhibits be announced during the show to encourage more traffic through the exhibits area.

Education – Scott Loos reported on the success of the counterfeit detection seminar held locally in January, co-sponsored by the PNNA and the ANA. The seminar was sold out. Five PNNA scholarships to attend were awarded, and other clubs provided several scholarships.

Outreach – James Reinders discussed his current focus on outreach to Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. A Scout clinic at the Spring Convention attracted 2 Girl Scouts and 5 Boy Scouts. James plans to hold the Scout Clinic again at next year's Convention and is looking for suggestions as to outreach projects outside of the conventions.

Rick Schulz coordinates the PNNA's participation at the Puyallup Fair. He discussed the success of that activity and also the new PNNA Club Representative program, which is intended to increase interaction between the PNNA and its member clubs as well as promote benefits available to the clubs. Rick also mentioned the possibility of obtaining an elongated cent machine for use at PNNA conventions and member club activities.

Membership – Dennis Stevens noted work on an updated member benefit flyer and discussed an idea to construct a kiosk to promote membership benefits at the shows.

Publications – Dale Reubish coordinates the PNNA coin show calendar. He is reaching out to smaller clubs and shows to ensure that they take advantage of the membership benefit of having their shows listed in the calendar.

Eric further discussed his work on the website and his initiative to move to Dreamhost website hosting.

Eric produced a special convention edition of *The Nor'wester* as he has done in recent years.

Election – Bill McKivor encouraged all in attendance to reach out to those who may be interested in running for a PNNA board position in the 2012 election. Bill would be happy to speak to anyone interested.

ANA Scholarship Awards – Danny Bisgaard announced the winners of the PNNA's 2011 scholarship awards to the ANA Summer Seminar: YN – Aaron Allemann, Adult – Jesse Torres.

Audience Q&A

Lisa next opened the meeting for questions and comments from the members. The following comments were noted:

Dennis Reed cautioned that clubs borrowing the sidewalk sign boards may need to alert the city authorities or obtain permission to use them so they are not picked up by the city. He also suggested that the PNNA work with the clubs to promote member benefits. This may involve use of the kiosk noted above. The new PNNA Club Representative program should help in this area once it is further along. There was a brief discussion of how to deal with early-birds who sometimes interfere with dealer setup.

Gay Graham expressed thanks to Walt Ostromecki for devoting his time and effort to the very successful YN activities at the Spring Conventions since 1998.

There was further discussion of the elongated cent machine and some cost and contact information. This possibility will be explored further.

John Bryan suggested that video recordings be made of Numismatic Theater presentations. Scott noted that he had been contacted by someone who could record the sessions and also produce other educational/promotional video files related to the Convention. He will explore that possibility in more depth.

Danny discussed the PNNA awards process and announced the following 2011 winners:

All awards were presented at the meeting and the winners congratulated.

Significant Dates on Both Sides of the Border

Collectors both north and south of the Canadian border are probably feeling the pinch of the high prices of gold and silver, and probably have been for the past few years. So, now might be a very good time to take a fresh look at an old starting point for our hobby – copper.

Both Canadian and U.S. coinage have a couple of hundred years of history when it comes to copper coinage; and the exact start point, on either side of the border, can be a fun debate. Do the myriad of "pre-Federal" U.S. coins and tokens get figured into a set of U.S. copper? Does the wealth of Canadian bank coins and tokens warrant consideration when looking at a collection of early Canadian issues? Whatever the answers are, something that can be fun is assembling a collection of copper with what we might want to call, "The Significant Dates." Let's start in 1857, for reasons that may become obvious, or may seem random. Here we go.

1857 – This was the final year of the United States large cent, as well as the first year for circulation of the small cent, the Flying Eagle cent. Both can be obtained today in a decent grade without too much expense. But looking to the north, there wasn't a unified Canadian copper coin for the year – so perhaps a Bank of Upper Canada token for the year will serve as the complement to the two U.S. cents.

1858 – This next year is the first for the Province of Canadian large cent, so it certainly has to be added to this growing list of significant dates. There is a scarce variety based on the obverse and reverse die alignment, but the common variety is as affordable as the two U.S. cents we just mentioned. So, after adding this large cent, we should now look south of the border, and add an 1858 Flying Eagle cent, the second year of a circulating U.S. small cent.

1859 – If it seems like each year qualifies as significant so far, well, it's because a lot was going on, both politically and numismatically, north and south of the border at the time. This year saw the first U.S. Indian cent issued, and so we might wish to add it as well. That means that we also will want to add an 1859 Province of Canada cent as well. There are a number of varieties from which to choose; and the good news for collectors today is that the most common still commands a relatively modest price, even in the higher circulated grades.

1876 – We ignored the changes in composition that occurred early in the U.S. Indian Head cent series (really, they are just metal changes), but by 1876, the first Canadian large cent was issued that would become part of a greater series – so that's worth adding to our growing collection. While there are some varieties here for portraits and leaves, the inexpensive ones are wonderfully so. You can break into mint state here without breaking a budget. As with our other dates, we'll add one from the other side of the border here too. A U.S. Indian needs to find its way into our collection as well. This date isn't all that common for the Indian heads, but it isn't really rare either.

1902 – As the century turned, we have the first Canadian large cent with Edward VII looking back from it. Once again, the price is quite low, making it easy to add to the collection. Keeping with the idea of adding the counterpart from across the border, we find that the U.S. Indian head cent of 1902 is amazingly common, and thus quite inexpensive as well.

1909 – By this year, we have both the first U.S. Lincoln cent and the last U.S. Indian head. There are storied rarities within both for these dates, but by sticking to the coins that are common we'll keep most of our own money in our pockets. But we need an Edward as well, and the 1909 won't cost much.

1910 – Right after the first of the new U.S. cents came the last of a Canadian design, meaning the last Edward V. So, this certainly qualifies as a significant year also. This cent is amazingly common – at 5.1 million it was pretty much the largest mintage for the series. But in keeping with our idea of adding its counter-

part, a U.S. Lincoln from 1910 should be added as well. That's not too tough to do, as the mintage for the Philadelphia issue was a massive 146.8 million coins.

1911 – Just like in the late 1850's there appears to be a series of years in which there were quite a few changes in Canadian and U.S. copper. The year 1911 saw the first George V cents to come out, and they did so in rather large quantities. Once again, the prices are quite attractive, even up in the mint state grades. A U.S. Lincoln cent of 1911 can be added as well, and at what is almost a fire sale price.

1920 – Nine years and one world war later the first Canadian small cents were issued. But, like the U.S. large and small cents of 1857, there is a large and a small Canadian 1920 that could easily be added to a growing copper collection. A U.S. Lincoln cent from the same year will be a low cost addition.

1937 – The next year that might meet our standard as significant is 1937, when the first Canadian George VI cents were issued. While we could argue about the 1936 dot, most of us will never own one, so we'll stick with the last British monarch to carry the title "Emperor of India," which is abbreviated on his coinage as IND IMP. A 1937 U.S. Lincoln cent is a very cheap addition to balance this year out.

1943 – While we ignored metal changes in U.S. cents back in 1860, it's probably still worth adding a 1943 U.S. steel cent to this collection, only because it's the only "copper" coin here not to have any copper in it. Adding a George VI cent to balance this out will again cost very little.

1953 – It was a new decade and the end of a different war that saw the first Canadian Elizabeth II cents issued. Both these cents and their U.S. counterparts were made in such large quantities that price guides usually start for each of them in conditions such as AU. These are easy to add to any collection.

Do we go onward from here? Sure, there are plenty of dates that have some significance on one side of the border or another that we have totally omitted, most of them from the last 50 years or so. The year 1982, for example, saw the first year of the 12-sided cent on the Canadian side, and the change from copper to copper-coated zinc on the U.S. side. Where you choose to end your collection of comparison dates is purely up to you. But by all means, don't let the high price of silver get you down. Enjoy some copper collecting from both north and south of the line.
