They Said It Couldn't Be Done by Larry Rowe (ANA convention general chairman)

The much awaited and much maligned 1998 ANA Convention (World's Fair of Money®) scheduled for Portland was a success! After many years of hearing that Portland is not a good venue for a national coin show, people are now asking when ANA is going to return to Portland! I have heard nothing but positive comments about the recent convention. PNNA should be proud of being the host association for two ANA conventions in the northwest this decade and having them both declared a success.

The 1998 ANA Convention was not a success just because it was held in Portland, it was a success because many people worked very hard to make it so. Knowing that this convention had to be just about perfect to overcome the negative attitude of many people, every effort was made to make it a pleasant experience for those who attended. Starting with ANA itself, the Convention Director put in a considerable amount of extra work. I have an idea what it takes to put on a national convention, but I have no idea how much detail there is required by the Convention Director. ANA also spent a considerable amount of money for promotion. The work of the Public Relations Officer working with a professional firm did an outstanding job of publicity for the convention. Everyone in the metropolitan area of Portland heard about the "Coin Show." Portland Oregon Visitors Association was a great help. A representative from POVA made the original pitch to the ANA board in 1990 in Seattle for the Portland show. They also went to Baltimore in 1993 to assist PNNA representatives to ask the ANA board to reinstate Portland after it was withdrawn. POVA assisted in many ways to make the convention what it was. Then there is the local committee. I can truthfully say that the local committee was made up of dedicated people who worked hard at their positions. The best single thing that I did for this show was to select excellent people. Many of the committee chairpersons came from the Willamette Coin Club of the Portland area. The DoubleTree Hotel, the host hotel, and the Oregon Convention Center worked with the Convention Director and General Chairman to make this convention special. They fulfilled many requests to make the Portland experience special to everyone. Then, during the convention, local volunteers as well as ANA national volunteers did much of the mundane work that has to be done. These people get little recognition for their work except the knowledge that without them nothing would have happened. The lesson here is that success comes from hard work.

The convention bourse consisted of about 350 dealers from all around the world. All aspects of numismatics were represented. It was almost a sure thing you could find what you were seeking for your collection. Many mints from around the world were selling products from their respective countries. Specialty clubs and organizations had tables to promote their groups. Many of them hold annual meetings at the ANA convention. The Numismatic Theater had several excellent speakers on a variety of subjects. The exhibits were outstanding. A display of British copper tokens was a special treat as these tokens seldom are seen except by collectors. An exhibit entitled "Road Kill" won the People's Choice Award again. (Actually, it was a tie.) This fascinating display is of coins found along the roadside for the period of one year.

Dealers were pleased with the business that they conducted and surprised with what the public brought in to sell. The official attendance for the convention is 11,100 people. This beats the official attendance of last year's convention in New York City by a slight margin! There were many social events in the evenings during the week, concluding with the ANA banquet on Saturday evening. The auction conducted by Heritage set an all-time ANA record with sales of \$12,300,000.

One event that Portland had that no other ANA convention had or will ever have was the 100th birthday party of ANA member Robert Hendershott. Bob celebrated his birthday with many friends and family all week, with a special party on his actual birthday on August 7th.

If you attended the convention, I hope that you had a good time and enjoyed a true convention experience. If you didn't attend the convention, you missed a great event!

Eight years ago, a bid was submitted for Portland, Oregon to host the 1998 ANA Convention. As we all remember, Portland became the first on again, off again, on again ANA Convention. The Willamette Coin Club known then as the West Side Coin Club was only three years old and most of us had never heard of the PNNA other than the fact that it had an annual show.

The members of the Willamette Coin Club got together and decided in order to have a good base for the ANA Convention, and not be embarrassed with no one showing up at the convention, that we needed a show here in Portland to pave the way for the ANA.

We are about to host our fifth PNNA Convention in 1999. Most of the members of the Willamette Coin Club were involved in the ANA Convention together with members of the PNNA which was the official

host club. Without having been involved in the PNNA show, we would have had a really tough time pulling it off. We were fortunate to have Larry Rowe as the General Chairman. He selected a group that truly worked as a team. The rest is as they say, History!

My personal experience at the convention and getting ready for it has been one of the best numismatic experience of my life. When it was over, I felt like I was going through withdrawal. The fun, excitement and camaraderie were hard to walk away from. I firmly believe that all concerned are stronger because of the experience. The PNNA has been changed because of the folks that worked together on the committees and volunteered for the grunt work. I was certainly proud to be around such great people. I was ready to do it all over again the next week. But there is no show here next week. But what about the future?

When the whole process started, eight years seemed so far in the future as to be almost a meaningless time period. But every day it got closer and closer, and then it was gone. So where do we go from here? I think the time is overdue for the PNNA to become more pro-active and work at preparing member clubs to take on the fun and excitement of putting on a PNNA Convention without the fear of failure. We need to start to assist member clubs and their members in meaningful ways by having training sessions in the nuts and bolts of what it takes to put on a convention. Portland and Seattle should not be the only venues for the shows and be trading off every five years.

If we don't someone else will for profit. As we witnessed, Teresa Darling gave it a good shot. Early on I felt she was a threat to us, but she provided a real nice venue for a show and brought in dealers who wouldn't otherwise have come to Seattle or Portland. I for one will miss her efforts. Dealers will support club shows, but clubs have an obligation to make sure there is good value for the dealers to come and spend money on tables, food, lodging and a club's coffers.

Bill McKivor and I have volunteered to do the Numismatic Theater for the PNNA Convention. When we call for speakers, please take some time and think how you can help whether the show is in Portland, Seattle, or Spokane. There are ways for the PNNA to make it easier to have guest speakers at the conventions, at least there should be.

I really feel that after the wonderful experience that so many dealers had in Portland, we will see more from around the country at our Convention/Show. This is a critical time to start the preparations. As second vice-president of the PNNA, a dealer, a member, and a numismatist I feel I have an obligation to build on our successes and continue the PNNA tradition of more commitment to our members and our communities. I am also sure that the experience many local people had at the ANA will bring out more collectors to our show. We need to offer them something to come out to. Over 11,000 people came to our party, I've got to believe that they weren't all out of towners. We must figure a way to get them to our PNNA Convention, make them not want to miss it.

We have a lot to be proud of, there is also a lot more to be done. When you are encouraged as a member to get involved in the PNNA Convention, do it! All of us have talents that can help. If it means driving down from Seattle to participate, do it. I guarantee the rewards are wonderful, and the friends you will make will be with you for a long time. Participation is what makes a club grow and prosper.

Commemorative Tokens Issued at National Money Show

The Willamette Coin Club is the host club for the 2004 ANA National Money Show in Portland Oregon. Special commemorative medals will be issued by the Willamette Coin Club to highlight the event. The obverse bears a likeness of the Rose of the House of Stuart together with the year of the show; Portland, Oregon is known as the Rose City. The reverse bears the logo of the American Numismatic Association.

Noted Oregon celator and engraver Greg Franck-Weiby is the medal's designer. Mr. Franck-Weiby will be available at the show to strike tokens in pewter and silver for the

public. Tom Maringer of the Shire Post Mint specially struck fifteen hundred copper tokens for the club. All were struck using three different and classic methods of coining. Copper tokens will be given to the first five hundred visitors each day of the National Money Show.

A limited run of about thirty commemorative sets will be available for sale at the convention on a first come first served basis. There will be one each of the tokens struck in copper, pewter, silver and .999 fine gold.

According to convention chairman Larry Gaye: "We are extremely excited about this event and wanted to have something special planned. Working with Mr. Franck-Weiby and Mr. Maringer has been a delight and we are pleased with the outcome of a lot of hard work."

Alan Weinberg (as reported in the *E-Sylum* at https://www.coinbooks.org/) – I usually do not attend the Spring ANA shows as they're too often in obscure places without a large collector base within a few hours driving distance. But the Portland summer ANA about 10 years ago was a humdinger, surprising many naysayers at the time. And it was a mere \$214 flight from LAX - so why not?

Well, the show was fabulous - particularly in view of the modest expectations of many - with one of the heaviest public attendances I've ever seen at any ANA or for that matter any coin show. Hoards of people and not just "lookie-loos," both on Friday and Saturday. A light drizzle in Portland helped the attendance and the bourse was a sell-out. You never saw so many people at a collectibles show - you had to turn sideways at times, return to a bourse table or exhibit later, due to crowds!

I roamed the bourse floor constantly and did not hear a single negative or mediocre comment. I did hear that the public was not spending big money, and many were buying modern material or bullion-based coins. But I do know a beautiful and mark-free Wass-Molitor \$50 changed hands on the floor, going to a prominent collector/dealer for his own collection at \$65K. I examined the coin - very atypical for this always bruised and marked up gold piece.

CoinRaritiesOnline (Dave Wnuck/John Agre) commented that they were quite surprised to have a highly active show with numerous mid-range coins selling. I know that collector/dealer Bill McKivor of The Copper Corner had one heck of a show with the most fascinating and diverse atypical numismatic material I can recall seeing at a bourse table. His table was a constant "beehive" of real collectors with many buying sizable quantities of tokens and medals. John Kraljevich's table was at times so busy you couldn't find a space to squeeze into. Even with the economy in the doldrums, people were spending money and were clearly fascinated by the material on the bourse floor and in the exhibits. There was a significant juvenile attendance too.

The exhibits were quite impressive with Jerry Bobbe's single case exhibit of Spence Conders in red and red-brown prooflike gems eliciting an involuntary "Oh my gosh!" as I walked up to it. Among the exhibits were a genuine 1804 dollar, a Gem Unc 1849 Oregon \$10 gold, and two 1913 nickels. The Bureau of Engraving and Printing had a separate huge exhibit which was a hit with high attendance.

I examined at length the new 2009 hi-relief double-thick \$20 (three of them) - just slabbed MS69 and 70. Ya know what? - there was a discernible difference in quality between the 69 and 70.

Dave Wnuck loaned me his just-released Whitman-published Dave Bowers Colonial Coin Encyclopedia. Real eye and mind candy, although I thought it needed a sturdier binding given its projected heavy use by collectors. But a beautiful book and the numerous plates!

The Oregon show staff that put together the show did a tremendous job all around. I know some of them and know them to be serious collectors. Bravo! I went home late Saturday, feeling fulfilled, happy, and assured of a healthy continuance for our hobby, regardless of the economy. Years ago, I'd heard the Northwest had a solid core of collectors. Must be true!



Report from ANA Press Release

Attendance strong at Portland National Money Show More than 4,500 members and collectors attend 3-day event

The American Numismatic Association's 2015 National Money ShowSM welcomed a total of 4,592 people for the three-day event, held March 5-7 at the Oregon Convention Center in Portland, Oregon.

Attendance was strongest on Saturday, March 7, when 1,420 members of the public turned out for free admission and free, educational appraisals on up to three coins or other numismatic items.

"Overall attendance during the Portland National Money Show was a little slow to start, but we had a great turnout by the end," said ANA President Walter Ostromecki. "Our Saturday attendance was particularly strong, with the public taking advantage of free admission and free appraisals on numismatic items. We also received some great media coverage from the local television affiliates, and the event was featured on National Public Radio's 'Here and Now' program, which airs all across the nation."

Stack's Bowers Galleries proudly presented the Official Auction for the Portland National Money Show, including selections from the Highland Collection. This compact sale brought big results, grossing a total of \$3,134,799.



James Reinders, an ANA Life Member, received the Steven J. D'Ippolito Best-in-Show Exhibit award for "Complete German States 3 Mark Commemorative Type Set (1908-1918)" as well as second place Best-in-Show for "Encased 3¢ Postage Stamps of the Civil War" at the 2015 National Money Show. Third place was awarded to Simcha Laib Kuritzky for "Boy for Sale? Middle Eastern Ingots for the Redemption of the Firstborn Son." The Radford Stearns Memorial Award for People's Choice, determined by votes from convention attendees, was presented to Thomas J. Uram for "The U.S. Two Cent Piece 1864-1873 with Major Varieties."

The National Coin Week Award was presented to Young Numismatist Alexander Mous for his exhibit "Alphabet Soup." Mous will receive a full scholarship to a future ANA Summer Seminar, an award endowed by numismatist John Albanese. Mous also won third place for "Coins of Morocco: Reform Coinage 1960 to Date." Second place was awarded to Richard Jozefiak for "The Start of a New Collectable—The Innovation of the First Elongated Souvenir Coins at the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago." National Coin Week exhibits are intended to be suitable for display in libraries and schools with a \$250 limit on the value of the materials in this competition.

Radford Stearns Memorial awards were also presented in six classes. This year, 35 competitive and two non-competitive exhibits were displayed in the Collector Exhibits area by 24 exhibitors.
