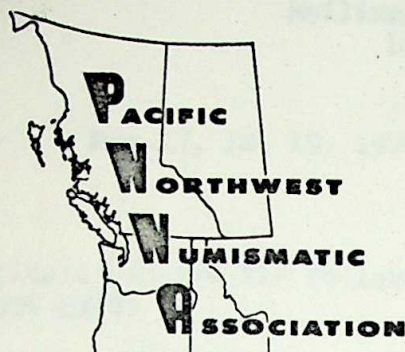

You are invited to enter your exhibits, competitive or non-competitive. A beautiful rotating trophy will be awarded to the "Best of Show" at the Awards Breakfast. This trophy will be retained by the winner until the 1975 PNNA Convention. Along with this there will be a "Best of Class" trophy for each of the classes listed below. In addition to the best of each class trophies, exhibits will be judged for first, second and third place ribbons.

Class 1--United States Coins

Class 2--Canadian Coins

Class 3--Foreign Coins

Class 4--Currency (U.S. and Foreign)

Class 5--Tokens, Medals and Medallion Art

Class 6--Wooden Money, Odd and Curious, or Miscellaneous

Class 7--Juniors (18 years and under)

Class 8--Court of Honor-for-non-competitive exhibits, especially those which have earned an award at a previous PNNA coin show. Special Award Ribbons will be presented to each exhibitor in this class.

JUDGING OF EXHIBITS

All exhibits for competition must be entered not later than 10am Saturday, May 18th, and they shall not be removed until 6pm Sunday, May 19th, unless special arrangements have been made with the Exhibits Chairman, and ok'd by the General Chairman of the convention.

Judging will follow the standard American Numismatic Association exhibits point system, using the following maximum points:

| 3. Completeness (material as related to title or theme of exhibit)----- | 15 points |

| Maximum point total----- | 100 points |

Exhibitors must be registered (No Fee), and may do so before being admitted to the Exhibits Room after 8AM Friday, May 17th to set up their displays. You are urged to use your own cases and locks, as the supply is limited. A maximum of five cases per exhibitor, please, unless special arrangements are made with the Exhibits Chairman before the convention.

A special "no host" Awards Breakfast will be held Sunday morning at 8:30am, at which time the trophies will be presented to the winning exhibitors. We hope you will attend.

SPECIAL NOTE: Due to scheduling problems at the Hyatt House, we can't utilize the Flight Lounge for displays until late Friday afternoon. If your display is fragile and can't be easily moved, we then ask you to wait until Friday afternoon to set your display in the Flight Lounge.

News from Idaho--Idaho Falls will have it's first coin show March 30-31 hosted by the Eagle Rock Numismatic Society. Frank Schell has authored two catalogs of Idaho merchant tokens and another book on Idaho ghost towns.

The current issue of the PNNA News sent to all PNNA Members is starting a listing of Masonic pennies of the Pacific Northwest. The list will cover Idaho, British Columbia, Washington and Oregon. Anyone wishing to receive the News and becoming a PNNA Member can send two dollars to the address above.

The next issue of the Bulletin will carry the schedule for the PNNA Show.

For collectors concerned with counterfeits and we all should be, the Vancouver Int'l Coin Enthusiast's Society (VICE) is holding a seminar again this year May 25-27. This is the US Memorial Day Weekend. Virgil Hancock, widely known as an expert and the driving force behind the ANA Certification Service will run the seminar. Cost is \$50. Reservations may be made by contacting V.I.C.E., P O Box 35484, Vancouver, BC V6M 4G8.

For those interested in a little history to go with their collections we recommend the book, "Untamed Olympics" by Ruby El Hult. The two numismatic issues are covered--one the Puget Sound Cooperative Colony scrip issued in 1887 or 1888, and the other the Lauridsen tokens and scrip used in Port Angeles during the Panic of 1893. Lots of background on these early issues.

With the increasing cost of copper, the Mint realizes the cent may have to be struck out of a cheaper material. Aluminum is proposed. The Mint has had experience with aluminum in the past. The first Mint proposal to use aluminum was in 1867. A pattern nickel was prepared showing an Indian Head design by Longacre. You will remember that in 1867 we had both a half dime and nickel five cent piece being struck. Aluminum at that time cost the same price as silver pound for pound. The Mint proposed to strike a five cent coin having the weight of the half dime thus having full bullion value and the size of the nickel five cent piece, which because of the low density of aluminum is possible. The idea could not be sold to Congress. In 1896, the House of Representatives requested tests of different alloys for coinage. Among those tested were pure aluminum and three aluminum alloys. There were striking problems with the alloys of that day, mainly the problem of metal flow. The planchet spread out to the collar before the metal came up into the dies. Today this can be solved by using a harder alloy or by using an appropriate relief in the dies. We look with interest on the future of aluminum in our coinage.

Get those exhibits prepared for the PNNA Convention and don't forget to show at your local coin shows. You stimulate interest in collecting by showing the public what numismatics is all about.

To save space, we will use abbreviations from the Atwood Catalog. These include K-copper, B-brass, Bz-bronze, Sv-silver, A-Aluminum, and WM-white metal. Where a piece is listed as a shekel it refers to a piece with an irregularly scalloped edge. All other pieces are round unless indicated.

PNNA Convention time is here. The 29th Annual PNNA Convention will be held at the Hyatt House Hotel May 17-19 just North of the Seattle-Tacoma Airport. The President of the ANA, Virginia Culver, will attend and we have a no-host reception for her scheduled May 16th at 7:30PM at the Hyatt House so you can meet her. The convention will open at 10AM May 17. The complete schedule is on the other side of this bulletin. Two tours for visitors to the city are scheduled, one of the new facilities at Seattle-Tacoma Airport and the other an underground tour of old Seattle--buildings and business houses buried after the streets were regraded after the fire in 1889. Wear a raincoat for this one. We will have a bourse of about 45 dealers, a large competitive exhibit area, educational programs, collector roundtable and a lot of sociability. Don't miss this, the largest coin show held in the Northwest. I would suggest Pre-registration in order to avoid lines. Your club officers should have a supply on hand--if not, let us know and we will send you one.

The PNNA was founded in 1940 at a joint meeting of the Seattle Coin Club and the Oregon Numismatic Society of Portland. The meeting was held in Centralia, Washington. After several years of meeting in Centralia, the PNNA had grown to include many clubs and the procedure of clubs hosting the convention in a host city was started. Conventions have been held in Salem, Walla Walla, Yakima, Vancouver, Springfield, Spokane, Portland and Seattle. I may have missed a couple cities. If your club has the facilities, why not bid to sponsor a PNNA Convention in some future year? Two cities have submitted bids already for the 1975 convention. The site will be voted on at this year's meeting. The Vancouver International Coin Enthusiasts Society (VICE) is holding a counterfeit seminar May 25-27. This is the US Memorial Day weekend so you can make all three days. Virgil Hancock will run the seminar. Cost is \$50. Less than 10 openings remain--contact V.I.C.E., P O Box 35484, Vancouver, BC V6M 4G8.

You should remember that if the price of copper hits \$1.50 per pound that both the US and Canadian cents will be melted down for the metal. Not too long ago when there was a strike of nickel miners, the price of nickel shot up and Canadian nickels were melted. They were pure nickel. The US nickel is only 25% nickel and the rest copper. We have not heard if the Canadian Mint has any standby plans to replace the bronze cent. It may be they are too concerned with the 28 coin Olympic series which were to be .925 silver and which may end up .500 fine or cupro-nickel if the present price of silver holds. The proposed profit which was to accrue to the Olympic Games in 1976 in Montreal have disappeared as the price of silver climbed. Interesting, wot?

What are the earliest numismatic items of the Pacific Northwest? The first items other than animal skins were Indian copper blankets made by the natives in upper BC. Most of the copper blankets seen today though were made of copper imported into the area by white men. There were native copper workings though before the coming of the whites. In 1792, Capt Robert Gray discovered the mouth of the Columbia River and laid the US claim to all land drained by it including part of BC and everything back to the Rockies. There was a medal issued to commemorate the sailing of this expedition of discovery in 1787 when they embarked. There are two silver specimens known. One in Oregon Historical Society Museum and the other in the Library of Congress. One tin specimen is known locally. The Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804-05 was next distributing silver medals to Indian Chiefs. The medals given out were of five types. Three, the Washington Season medals and the other two the middle and small size Jefferson medals. In 1820 the Northwest Company issued the token shown in the Redbook. Though Canadian catalogs list the piece also it was used only along the Columbia River. Want more?

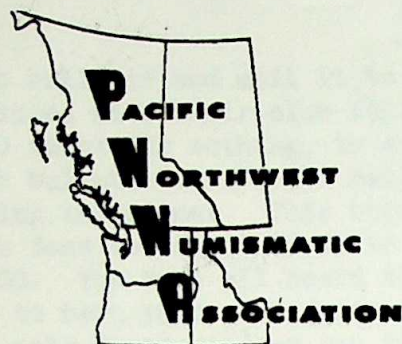

This issue of the club bulletin we are not mailing the full supply cause many of the clubs do not meet during the summer. You have all heard the story before--costs are going up. We would encourage you to have your club join as a lot can be derived from their participation. The PNNA can only be as good as you the members make it. The cooperation I have received is overwhelming and I do mean it? These people are all dedicated people and I really enjoy working with them. It's a lot more fun if you take an active part. Just let me know and you can be part of the team too.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of my committee chairmen and all the workers who put in time on the PNNA Convention to make it the great success that it was. Several members commented on early issues of numismatic items in the last issue. We'll continue. About 1833 or 1834 Nathaniel Wyeth traded buttons to the Indians along the Columbia River. The buttons were uniform buttons from the Army of Henri Christophe, King of Haiti, whose government had collapsed. The Indians knocked off the shank, holed the buttons and used them as ornaments. They are called Phoenix buttons from the main device on them. In 1844, a fellow named Abernathy, later Provisional Governor of the Oregon Territory, issued change in his grocery made of pieces of paper glued on handy size rocks. Right, ricks. Only one specimen has survived and it is in the Oregon Historical Society Museum. And in 1849, the Oregon Beaver gold pieces were issued and they are listed in the Redbook. More later.

MASONIC MEDALS OF IDAHO STATE

The only Masonic medals we have reported from Idaho are Royal Arch Mason Chapter Pennies. To save space we use Atwood abbreviations-K-copper, B-Brass, Bz-bronze, A-Aluminum, WM-whitel metal, and Sv-silver. When a piece is listed as a shekel, it refers to a piece with an irregularly scalloped edge. All other pieces are round unless indicated. We do not have the diameter of most pieces.

Please report any other medals you may know of. It is much easier to gather information right now than to wait a few years. The 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch medal may turn out to be rare since the issue price is \$89.95 plus tax. The gilt silver is according to reports \$149.95. The gold medal when issued will be even more since as of this writing gold is hovering about \$180 to \$190 an ounce and the medal is to 1.1 ounce.

As we told you last issue, the PNNA is hopeful of setting up some more helpful programs for collectors and clubs. Work is well under way on having an exhibit judging training program. Interested collectors will have an opportunity to learn how to judge exhibits using the ANA scoring system. A former ANA head judge will be the teacher. Exhibitors should be interested also in how their exhibits will be scored. If you know what judges look for or what they dislike, you can gain a better score for your display. More details on place and time will appear in future issues.

The ANA Convention in Miami Beach is over. A reported 15,000 attended and about 175 dealers had tables. Northwest collector Forrest Dunham missed elected to the TAMS Board by just 19 votes. Byron Johnson completed his terms as TAMS President. Gene Henry, Martin Levy, and Mike O'Hara were in attendance. Two former Northwest dealers, Simpson Salter and Ken Rimondi were there to say hello. They both now live in Florida. The new 1976 coins were on exhibit. Ordering details were announced at the ANA business meeting by Mary Brooks. All those on the Mint mailing list will receive order forms in November. Next years' convention is in Los Angeles.

A new national coin organization has started right here in the Northwest. The Society of U.S. Pattern Collectors is signing up members. Interested collectors can write 429 SW 10th Ave., Portland, Oregon 97205. This new group will offer a photographic service, a newsletter, and will attempt an inventory of all rare pattern coins. The group will hold a convention Nov. 22-24, 1974 at the Masonic Temple in Portland. Interestingly, the top door prize announced is a U.S. Pattern coin.

Work is progressing on the 1975 PNNA Convention to be held in the Tri-Cities on May 16-18, 1975. The PNNA Board will meet there shortly to go over details of the show.

If your club is holding a show, putting on an exhibit, or changing meeting place or time, please let us know so we can list the event in this paper which is sent to 2500 collectors in the Pacific Northwest. Deadline for the next issue is December 1st.

As its contribution to the Bi-Centennial, the ANA will hold an exhibit of Colonial coins and paper money in Colorado Springs. After the exhibit in 1976, a large catalog will be published. Two famous collections are already promised. Also in the exhibit line, the San Francisco Mint will hold a large exhibit this November. Watch the coin publications for details.

We had a report that the Spokane Expo official medals are finally on sale as of about three weeks ago. We don't know ordering details. They must be trying to keep them secret. There are two sizes in silver and bronze. There is also a \$1 trade coin which apparently does not really circulate but is sold for \$1.25. If you attend the fair, look around and maybe you can find out yourself what is happening.

Those who did not order the Wash. State Bicentennial medal when it first came out are now stuck with higher prices due to the rise in silver price. Silver medals are \$21.24 and \$73.90. Bronze medals are \$2.89 and \$10.95. Prices include tax and postage. Address is 315 North Stadium Way, Tacoma, Wa 98403. The Wash. State American Revolution Bicentennial Commission.

Besides this Bulletin, the PNNA publishes the PNNA News sent only to PNNA members. Each issue has part of a continuing catalog of Pacific Northwest numismatic items.
